The Adelphi Experience Begins at Orientation.

Adelphi's three-day First-Year Student Orientation program is a wonderful introduction to life at Adelphi. Resident and commuter students stay in a residence hall, familiarize themselves with the campus, register for classes and participate in activities that will help them discover all of the opportunities, services and support that Adelphi has to offer.

F.I.R.S.T. PROGRAM

The transition from high school senior to college freshman can be challenging. For this reason, Adelphi has created the Freshman Initiative to Realize a Successful Transition (F.I.R.S.T.) program, which includes classes and activities designed to make moving into your first year at Adelphi seamless and satisfying. F.I.R.S.T. provides peer-to-peer programs, academic support and special services for students and parents, encouraging personal, academic, social and cultural growth. First-Year Orientation Experience (FORE)

This 1-credit course will ensure that first-year students can navigate important campus services and facilities, such as Swirbul Library, the Learning Center, the Writing Center, the Center for Career and Professional Development, the Office of Academic Services and Retention, and the Division of Student Affairs.

First-Year Seminar

This 3- or 4-credit course introduces freshmen to academic life at Adelphi. Taught by professors in their specific areas of expertise, the seminar provides an opportunity for critical thinking, thoughtful writing experiences and discussion.

First-Year Reading Experience

All freshman students are assigned the same reading. The selection varies each year and can range from fiction and

poetry to political science and autobiography. This reading is part of the Adelphi Community Reads program and gives students an integrated learning experience where they have the chance to share their opinions and develop close relationships with other members of the Adelphi community.

MENTORING AND NETWORKING

Adelphi University Mentoring Program

The Adelphi University Mentoring Program was created to help ensure academic success. Open to all students—ideally within their first year—the program was designed to help students of color, LGBTQ+ students, veteran students and students who may be the first in their families to attend college fulfill their highest potential with the guidance of a mentor. Transfer students are also encouraged to apply. There is no GPA requirement and students qualify by being a current/active (fully registered and taking classes) undergraduate student. Peer-to-Peer

There are numerous resources for peer support, including Orientation leaders, commuter assistants, resident assistants,

tutors, peer health and wellness educators, peer assistant leaders (PALs), the Resident Student Association, residence hall councils and student government groups. These peer leaders ensure that all first-year students know they belong and are supported in a variety of ways by their fellow students.

Commuter Assistant Program

The Commuter Assistant Program assigns an upperclassman to each first-year commuter student to assist in the transition to college. Commuter assistants serve as liaisons between the commuter students and the University by promoting involvement and providing resources to their mentees.
